AG RX - Agriculture Career Fair







On March 3rd Alma Robles (HR), Manuel Magana (PCA) and Andy Klittich (PCA) attended an AG Career fair held at the Agriculture Museum in Santa Paula. High school students from all of the high school Agriculture programs where invited to come and speak with different companies involved in agriculture in Ventura County. Contact Weed Control in Avocados and Citrus

As many of you have found out, we are experiencing some difficulty with controlling certain weeds in our coastal avocado and citrus orchards. Holden Research and Consulting has been conducting quite a few experiments with newer contact weed control products over the past five years for help in managing these weeds. Hairy fleabane, Marestail, and Stinging nettle are a few of these difficult to control weeds. Glyphosate is still effective on very small weeds, but once they grow past 2 or 3 inches in height, some of these hard to control weeds become difficult to kill. Many new options have come to our attention in the past few years. Some are old standards like gramoxone, while newer contact and tank mix partners have shown up like the glufosinate products along with Treevix and Broadworks. Not all of these products are registered for use in both avocados and citrus. Please see the included chart indicating which materials may be used where. Also some of the products may be very effective, but a little harder to use due to regulatory requirements (an example is gramoxone, which no longer requires a closed system to handle, but does need a permit to purchase).

A few photos have been provided to show the results with these products. Photos 1, 2, and 3 show the burn down of Hairy fleabane seven days after treatment in this order: glyphosate, glufosinate, and gramoxone.







Photo 4 is an example of a mature Stinging nettle plant prior to treating with a glyphosate/Broadworks tank mix and Photo 5 shows the plants three weeks post treat with that same tank mix.

The options for spring-summer-fall post emergent weed control have changed quite a bit in the past five years with more and more weed resistance being found with glyphosate and newer products being brought to the marketplace. I think you will be pleased with the results. Consult your Pest Control Advisor for recommendations on use rates, tank mixes, and timing. Remember to fully read the labels and to be aware of the use rates, timings, and issues. These are herbicides. Please be aware of how to handle them for your safety and your crop's safety

What's in your backyard?



Our field trip was a visit to the Sun Valley Group in Oxnard. We met with Gerrit Vanderkooy who is the Oxnard General Manager. Gerrit was our guide as we toured their facility and grounds. They have divisions in Arcata and Oxnard. The Oxnard location is on 68 acres, they also have an 80 acre farm.



The major crops they grow are Gerbera Daisy's, Germini, Asters,

Iris, Lilies and Delphinium. Valentine's Day and Mother's Day

are some of their busiest times of the year. We were here in April as they were getting ready
for Mother's Day.

Gerrit took us around and showed us the various crops. The bulb flowers start in Holland. Once in California they are placed in cold storage to get them ready for planting. It is important that the bulbs are placed in fresh ground at planting as this gives the high quality flowers that they are known for.

The Delphinium plant stock comes from Israel. They are planted in stages so that flowers are available throughout the year.

There are many different Lily types that they grow also. They will grow them to their customers specific needs, such as stem length.

Aster's have become a large crop for them also. They are able to have them flowers year round by manipulating light to trick them into blooming. Columbia controlled the Aster market, but because of their high quality California grown flowers Sun Valley has been able to take control back.

Once the flowers have been harvested they are sorted and graded. Then off to the warehouse where they will be cooled and then put into many different bouquet's. Sun Valley takes great pride in their warehouse as it was designed to exceed industry standards to insure proper cooling of the cut flowers.

The amount of work and the processes that go into that bouquet of California grown flowers is really incredible. Thank you Sun Valley and especially Gerrit for our wonderful tour. Remember the next time you buy cut flowers at your grocery store, big box store or wherever you may purchase them...look for that California grown stamp.

In this newsletter we interview Jeff Lundberg, President and CEO of Babe' Farms. Babe' Farms was founded in 1986 by Will Souza, Frank & Judy Lundberg and Greg & Cherrie Pedigo. They started out as a small innovative company and were one of the first to introduce packaged European salad mixes "mesclun", hand selected specialty greens and a colorful array of baby vegetables into the United States and Canada. Today Babe' Farms grows and harvests over 70 different varieties of gourmet vegetables. Judy Lundberg-Wafer, one of the original founding members of Babe' Farms, and her son Jeff now own and operate the company.

How did you get started in this business?

I grew up on a farm and worked with my father and grandfather since I was in grammar school. My parents Frank and Judy Lundberg along with partners Will Souza, Greg and Cherrie Pedigo formed Babé Farms in 1986. I graduated from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo in 1994, majoring in Ag. Engineering technology with an Ag Business minor, and then returned to Santa Maria to work for Babé Farms in production and operations.

What are some of your greatest challenges? What concerns you most? The biggest challenge in agriculture

today is the lack of a very precious resource, water.

Labor shortages is another big challenge we are all facing in California. And the third challenge is the oppressive regulatory environment that continues to negatively impact farms and agribusinesses in California. If we could pick up our ground, the climate and move out of state like a lot of businesses are doing, we would. We do not have that luxury.

What book are you currently reading?

I'm not reading a book right now, but I do make a point daily to read produce/ag industry news either online or the print version. As a business owner it's important to stay current and well informed.

What hobbies/activities do you like to do with your spare time?
